1 unbaked 9-inch pastry shell 1 can (12-1/2-oz. or 13-oz.) tuna, drained, flaked 1 cup grated Swiss cheese 1/2 cup sliced green onions 3 eggs 1 cup Hellmann's Real Mayonnaise

1/2 cup milk

Pierce pastry thoroughly with fork and bake in 375 degree oven for 10 minutes - remove. In a large bowl, toss together the tuna, cheese and green onions and spoon into pastry shell. In a generously buttered baking dish, arrange half of the zucchini in the bottom of baking dish. Add half of the onions. tomatoes, pepper and 1/2 cup of the grated cheese. Dot with 2 tablespoons of the butter or margarine. Repeat layering procedure (dish will be very full). Cover with aluminum foil and bake in 375 degree oven for 45 to 60 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Remove from oven, remove foil, and top with remaining 1/2 cup cheese and return to oven until cheese melts. Serves 8.

OLD FASHIONED POTATO SALAD

Dressing (recipe follows) 8 medium potatoes 1/4 cup cider vinegar 1/4 cup vegetable oil 1/2 cup thinly sliced green onions 2 teaspoons salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Cook the potatoes until tender, drain, peel and slice into a large mixing bowl. Add the cider vinegar, oil, green onions, salt and pepper to potatoes and toss just until potatoes are moistened. Cover and refrigerate for 2 or 3 hours or until marinade is absorbed. Pour dressing over the potatoes and toss gently to coat well. Chill until time to serve. Serves 12.

Dressing: 1-1/2 tablespoons all-purpose flour 1-1/2 tablespoons sugar 1 teaspoon dry mustard 2 tablespoons cider vinegar

Combine the flour, sugar, dry mustard and salt in a medium saucepan and the stir in the milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Remove from heat. Beat

1 small green cabbage, cut into 1-inch chunks 1/2 green pepper, cut up

1/2 to 3/4 cup mayonnaise 1/4 cup sour cream 2 teaspoons lemon juice 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard 1/8 teaspoon pepper

Fill electric blender container to top-cup marking with the vegetables. Add cold water just to cover vegetables. Cover blender container and process just long enough to chop vegetables - 3 to 4 seconds. Pour mixture into strainer to drain thoroughly. Repeat with remaining vegetables. Mix the mayonnaise, sour cream, lemon juice, salt, mustard and pepper together and pour over chopped vegetables and blend well. Serves 6.

FRESH STRAWBERRY CAKE

This wonderful cake needs to be refrigerated.

1 box white cake mix 1 small box strawberry Jell-O 4 tablespoons self-rising flour 3/4 cup vegetable oil 1 cup mashed fresh strawberries 1/2 cup water 4 eggs Icing (recipe follows)

Combine the dry ingredients and blend. Add the remaining ingredients and beat after the addition of each egg. Grease and flour 2 cake pans. Pour batter into pans and bake in 350 degree oven for about 30 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

Icing: 1 box powdered sugar 1 stick butter or margarine 1/2 cup mashed fresh strawberries

Combine the powdered sugar and margarine and cream before adding the strawberries, little at a time. Blend well before frosting cake.

REFRIGERATOR STRAWBERRY JAM

2 cups mashed ripe strawberries 4 cups sugar 1 package Sure-Jel 1 cup water 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Combine the strawberries with the sugar and allow them to stand at least 10 minutes. In a saucepan, combine the Sure-Jel and water, blend, and bring to a boil. Boil rapidly for 1 minute, remove from heat and add to crushed strawberries. Stir well for 3 minutes. Pour into sterilized jelly jars and cover tightly with lids and allow to stand overnight. Store in refrigerator. Will keep in refrigerator for about 2 months.

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




Combine the sugar, cornstarch, water and ground nutmeg and blend. Place mixture in a small saucepan and stir until well blended. Add the peaches and cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture boils. Boil for 1 minute and remove from heat. Stir in almond extract. Serve warm. Makes 1-1/3 cups.

2 pounds ground chuck or round 2 eggs 1/2 cup packaged breadcrumbs 1-1/2 teaspoons salt 1/4 teaspoon pepper 2 cups fresh mushrooms, chopped 1 cup finely chopped onions 1 tablespoon butter or margarine 1/2 cup grated sharp Cheddar cheese

Combine the beef, eggs, breadcrumbs, salt and pepper and divide into 8 thin patties. Sauté the mushrooms and onions in butter until golden. Spoon onion mixture on center of each patty and then top with 2 tablespoons cheese. Top patties with remaining 4 patties and press edges to seal. Grill five inches from coals for about 15 minutes for medium, turning two or three times.

Financial Focus: Saying "I Do" Might Mean "I Can't" for Roth IRA

June is a popular month for weddings. If you are planning on tying the knot this month, it's an exciting time, but be aware that being married might affect you in unexpected ways - including the way you invest. If you and your new spouse both earn fairly high incomes, you may find that you are not eligible to contribute to a Roth IRA.

A Roth IRA can be a great way to save for retirement. You can fund your IRA with virtually any type of investment, and, although your Dan M. Roberts, contributions are not deductible, any earnings growth is distributed tax-free, provided you don't start withdrawals until you are 59-1/2 and

you've had your account at least five years. In 2018, you can contribute up to \$5,500 to your Roth IRA, or \$6,500 if you're 50 or older.

But here's where your "just married" status can affect your ability to invest in a Roth IRA. When you were single, you could put in the full amount to your Roth IRA if your modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) was less than \$120,000; past that point, your allowable contributions were reduced until your MAGI reached \$135,000, after which you could no longer contribute to a Roth IRA at all. But once you got married, these limits did not double. Instead, if you're married and filing jointly, your maximum contribution amount will be gradually reduced once your MAGI reaches \$189,000, and your ability to contribute disappears entirely when your MAGI is \$199,000 or more.

Furthermore, if you are married and filing separately, you are ineligible to contribute to a Roth IRA if your MAGI is just \$10,000 or more.

So, as a married couple, how can you maximize your contribu-

tions? The answer may be that, similar to many endeavors in life, if one door is closed to you, you have to find another - in this case, a "backdoor" Roth IRA.

Essentially, a backdoor Roth IRA is a conversion of traditional IRA assets to a Roth. A traditional IRA does not offer tax-free earnings distributions, though your contributions can be fully or partially deductible, depending on your income level. But no matter how much you earn, you can roll as much money as you want from a traditional IRA to a Roth, even if that amount exceeds the yearly contribution limits. And once the money is in the Roth, the rules for tax-free withdrawals will apply.

Still, getting into this back door is not necessarily without cost. You must pay taxes on any money in your traditional IRA that hasn't already been taxed, and the funds going into your Roth IRA will likely count as income, which could push you into a higher tax bracket in the year you make the conversion.

Will incurring these potential tax consequences be worth it to you? It might be, as the value of tax-free withdrawals can be considerable. However, you should certainly analyze the pros and cons of this conversion with your tax advisor before making any decisions.

In any case, if you've owned a Roth IRA, or if you were even considering one, be aware of the new parameters you face when you get married. And take the opportunity to explore all the ways you and your new spouse can create a positive investment strategy for your future.

Not Too Late To Honor Our Soldiers



You did not get to a parade or service on Memorial Day. You can't get to the Normandy beaches this week for the anniversary of D-Day. You are feeling a need to be in touch with the sacrifices service men and women made for our country's sake-for our sake.

I have a suggestion to help you fill that need. By visiting one place in North Carolina, you can go to a recreated village in Normandy and witness paratroopers and glider forces attack while their comrades storm the beaches. You can see how those troops were delivered. A very real

restored C-47 "Skytrain" is high above with an airborne soldier standing in the door, ready to leap. A rare fully restored WACO CG-4A glider is packed with soldiers anxiously awaiting their landing and deployment.

At the Airborne & Special Operations Museum in downtown Fayetteville, you can also see constructed soldiers in their World War II uniforms dropping from above. One of them even looks to me like Dwight Eisenhower.

The Normandy exhibit, though vivid and timely, is only part of the museum's depic-

tion of the early days of the airborne soldiers. Visitors learn how the paratrooper concept developed. On August 16, 1940, Lieutenant Bill Ryder, leader of the initial test platoon, was the first American soldier to jump out an airplane's door. Major General William C. Lee, who grew up in nearby Dunn, was deeply involved and became known as "the Father of the Airborne."

The museum's exhibits cover airborne and special operations up to the present time. Some of the depictions put the visitor in the middle of battle in scenes from the Pacific theatre of World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Panama, Somalia, Iraq, Afghanistan and other parts of the world.

watching the movements of an Iraqi convoy during the Persian Gulf War, and the meeting of a group of Afghan elders.

If you want something even more realistic, you can experience the tension of an airborne assault in a simulator that mimics the loud bouncing plane ride to the drop zone and the sudden peaceful feeling as you depart the plane: your parachute opens, and it is suddenly quiet. You ride in the gliders and land with them on D-Day. You jump with the 187th in 1951 Korea. You are with the 82nd Airborne and 17th Cavalry in Vietnam in a Huey helicopter, flying low, toward an enemy waiting near the landing zone. In Afghanistan you exit a Chinook helicopter in a rugged vehicle and travel on a rough and dangerous road toward Kandahar. In Iraq you accompany a Special Forces team on the Euphrates River and pass by Saddam

Hussein's palace.

Such dramatic depictions do not stand alone. The museum is full of smaller displays and artifacts that help put the larger ones in context and tell the soldiers' stories. "Without the stories, all this is just stuff," one of the museum's leaders told me.

The museum's modern day hero is retired Gen. James J. Lindsay, who founded the museum and serves as chairman emeritus. Last month Lindsay was

inducted into the inaugural class of the 82nd Airborne Division's All American Hall of Fame. He held eight positions in the 82nd, from platoon leader to division commander. Later he was the first commanding general of U.S. Special Operations Command.

After his retirement, Lindsay worked tirelessly to create the museum and help secure funds for building construction and on-going operations. Now, he is pushing an effort to fund the museum's mod ernization.

Circa 1810 At The Harvey Mansion Music And Italian Cuisine



By Cathwren Hermon "Smooth as Tennessee whiskey . . ." When I arrived at the outdoor venue at Circa 1810 on 221 S. Front Street in New Bern. the band - the Arlin Tart Trio - was just coming off break. On Saturdays, there is live music from 8:00 - 11:00 p.m.

I didn't realize

fine Italian food with a glass of wine, of course. I ordered a calzone from the late night menu, thinking that it would make a nice snack, but what came to my table was a massive calzone, accompanied by a ramekin of marinara sauce with large chunks of tomato for dipping, pouring, or just eating by itself. I immediately planned to take part of it home with me, but the music was hypnotic, and I ate every last bite of that lovely Italian sausage, pepperoni, ricotta, mozzarella, and parmesan cheese, wrapped in a warm, tasty blanket spiced lightly with garlic and oregano.

The crowd wouldn't let the band take another break, and clearly the musicians were enjoying themselves. As a musician, I know how difficult it is to play requests, especially when you have two other musicians following you, but the lead guitarist mastered it handily, even relaying chords to a talented bass guitarist, as they played. Everyone was delighted. I was totally entranced by the music, the food, and the companionship, as I conversed with a couple from Denver. The man who originally sang Tennessee whiskey again was urged to the stage for an encore. The music bookended a memorable evening of food and fun.



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until afterwards that the man who was singing with a mellow baritone backed by three instruments - a lead guitar, bass guitar, and drums was actually from the audience! Arlin Tart was improvising the accompaniment, and they continued non-stop for the next two hours, generally setting an enjoyable musical mood.


The handsome and comfortable wicker furniture outside is indicative of the décor inside, as the Harvey Mansion (once the home of shipbuilder John Harvey) is historic, and the dining rooms reflect the dark wood and lush design of the original house built in late 18th century and used for various venues beginning in the early 1800's, thus the relatively new name Circa (around) 1810 at the Harvey Mansion.

I discovered from Alyssa, the enthusiastic waitress, that there is a late night selection of food that includes pizza, fried mozzarella, Cajun wings, and Stromboli, but she also offered me the "ristorante Italiano" full dinner menu with antipasto dishes that include bruschetta, mussels, calamari, and several salads with my favorite, caprese.

There are a variety of pastas that are served with several types of sauce and add-ons, like sautéed shrimp and grilled chicken for a "build your own pasta" section. Then, of course, there are classics like ribeye steak, veal, eggplant, pork, chicken, and specialty pastas, along with seafood offerings like linguine and clams, Mediterranean salmon, and a sampler called "Seafood Alla Pescatore" (mussels, clams, calamari and shrimp). The desserts include tiramisu, gelato, and cannoli.

Typically, I don't eat a hearty meal after 4 p.m., but the atmosphere of happy people grooving to the music (the band obviously has a large following among all age ranges), made me want to enjoy some




