None of us knew what to think but we knew we were getting out of class. I immediately found my people but nobody knew what was going on. The track team came together, taking selfies with Coach Rose, and having fun. It started off as a pretty day so we were laid back, soaking up the sunshine and unexpected free time with our friends.

But then my phone rang, and my auntie said "are you ok?!?" Everything felt different with that question because that's the moment I learned someone had called in a bomb threat to Pamlico County High School. I was scared. We all questioned, "Is this real?" and felt a bit insecure wondering what could happen next.

Our then superintendent, Mrs. Lisa Jackson was given a microphone and she very calmly told us what was happening and what would happen next. My worries started to even out. What felt like only moments later, my dad pulled up and I was taken home for an afternoon nap.

That bomb threat is my favorite high school memory. It highlights some of the most precious parts that make Pamlico what it is.

That day was all about people. Before we knew what was really happening our entire student body was together in one spot and nobody was alone. You heard laughter. You saw people playing around. You saw huddles of friends chatting and taking pictures. You saw teachers doing the same.

When people realized we were dealing with a bomb threat the mood changed, but the people didn't. They weren't laughing as much, but they were checking on each other, calling their parents, and hugging their friends.

It was all about the people. We were scared, even though there was some part of me that thought, "this could never happen here." We were scared, but I never thought I wasn't safe.

I knew which adults to look at and they were calm.

Our Superintendent was serious, but steady. Our staff was helping and still smiling.

I knew which friends to go to and heard the words, "Bro, it's gonna be ok."

I saw Sheriff Chris Davis leading the buses on a lawnmower because, of course, it's the County.

bachelor degree



The number of bachelor's degrees awarded by colleges and universities has increased considerably in the twenty-first century. According to the National Center for Education Statistics, roughly 1.238 million bachelor's degrees were awarded by colleges and universities in 2000. By 2021, that figure had nearly doubled, reaching 2.066 million. The number of students who earned associate's and master's degrees also grew by considerable margins between 2000 and 2021, with each nearly doubling. Doctorate and professional degrees remained a little more steady, though the number of students who earned each increased from just under 119 million in 2000 to 194.1 million in 2021.

Education Statistics

Data from the National Center for Education Statistics indicates that business was the most popular bachelor's degree conferred during the 2019-20 school year. NCES date indicates that 387,900 bachelor's degrees in business were conferred during that school year. "Business" included programs such as management, marketing, and related support services, as well as culinary, entertainment, and personal services. Next up was health professions and related programs (257,300 degrees) and social sciences and history (161,200 degrees). Curiously, despite a growing emphasis on STEM in many secondary school curriculums, just 6 percent of bachelor's degrees (128,300) were conferred in engineering.




