




County Honors Veterans

From Pamlico to State: PCC joins Wolfpack Connect initiative

Qualified Pamlico Community College students now have a guaranteed transfer pathway to N.C. State University, thanks to a new statewide initiative linking all 58 of North Carolina's community colleges to the state's largest university.

Wolfpack Connect, launched through a partnership between the N.C. Community College System and NCSU, guarantees admission for community college students who earn an associate degree, maintain at least a 3.0 GPA, and meet the Raleigh university's transfer deadlines.

The program opens doors to more than 100 eligible majors and concentrations at NCSU, creating a seamless transfer pathway for qualified PCC students.

"This is an exciting new opportunity for our community mem-President Zac Schnell. "A student courtesy of NCSU

can start with us at PCC and save money during their first two years of college while also getting the N.C. State experience after their associate degree is complete with us. It's great to see my alma mater provide this wonderful opportunity."

To qualify for guaranteed admission through Wolfpack Connect, Pamlico students must:

* Apply and be accepted into Wolfpack Connect before completing 30 transferable credits at PCC,

Students who enroll in the Wolfpack Connect program can begin their bers to have a guaranteed option college careers at Pamlico Community College and then transfer seamto transfer to N.C. State," said PCC lessly to N.C. State University to complete their four-year degrees. Photo

* Earn at least 30 transferable credit hours with grades of C or

* Complete an Associate in Arts (AA) or Associate in Science (AS) degree aligned with their intended NCSU major,

* Maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0,

* Meet all application deadlines and program-specific admission requirements and prerequisites,

* Enroll in their declared NCSU major within four years of being accepted into the program.

PCC Math Instructor and Associate in Science program advisor Meredith Glover - herself an alumna of NCSU - will serve as the college's point of contact for students interested in joining the program.

Wolfpack Connect will begin accepting eligibility forms in January 2026 for students planning to enroll at NCSU in Fall 2026.

Pamlico already offers similar transfer agreements with East Carolina University and Barton College. It is currently working on a new partnership with Western Carolina University.

Oriental Town Board Elections

After observing increasingly contentious Town Board meetings over the past two years, the voters of Oriental opted to clean house in the November 4 municipal elections by voting in an entirely new board. The change had already begun as one sitting board member, Frank Roe, had resigned his seat due to the fact that he had moved out of the town limits of Oriental. He was replaced on an interim basis by a former Commissioner, Sandy Winfrey, who had adamantly stated that he had no aspirations to rejoin the board beyond filling in for the remainder of Roe's term. Two more board members, Charlie Overcash and Breena Litzenberger, made the decision not to run for reelection. That left only two incumbents on the ballot, Bonnie Crosser and Allen Price, who finished 9th and 10th respectively out of a field of 11. With the top five vote getters gaining seats on the Board, that meant that on December 9th when the new Board is sworn in, there will be five new faces governing the Town. The one holdover, longtime Mayor Sally Belangia, who was running unopposed, retains her gavel as Mayor. All the candidates in the election had stated that their goal will be to work together for the good of the town and end the divisiveness that had dominated local political discussions the past few months. Time will tell if the new members of the board will see it through. Voter turnout was heavy with 547 ballots cast which translates to over 52% of the 1,043 eligible voters.



Spring Bulbs in November

Many of us incorporate spring-flowering bulbs into our landscapes to enjoy seeing the first colors of spring. However, the time you plant spring-flowering bulbs is not a time of year that you would typically be thinking about spring color.

Spring-flowering bulbs are planted in November when the soil temperature has dropped below 60°F. Spring-flowering bulbs include daffodils, tulips, crocus, and hyacinths, just to name a few. A bulb is like having a pre-packaged plant because everything the plant needs to successfully grow is inside the bulb. Bulbs store the plant's food and energy needed to survive and successfully grow. The reason that spring-flowering bulbs are planted in November is that most need a 12- to 16-week chilling period to produce flowers. Planting in November will allow for bulbs to meet the needed chilling requirement to produce spring flowers. When bulbs do not receive a long enough chilling period, they usually have shorter stems and bloom close to the ground.

When purchasing bulbs, choose ones without mold, bruising, or soft spots. If you purchase bulbs in September or October, they should be stored in a cool area until planting time. Planting depth and spacing of bulbs is based on the bulb's size. Plant bulbs three to four times as deep (measured from the bulb's base) as the width of the bulb. For plant spacing, plant large bulbs 3 to 6 inches apart and small bulbs 1 to 2 inches apart.

Fertilizing bulbs will not help with this season's performance, since the bulb already has food stored for the plant, however it will help for the future seasons. There are two options for fertilizing bulbs. One option is to include a slow-release fertilizer in the soil as you are planting the bulbs. The second option is to apply a soluble, quick-release fertilizer at the time of planting and again when shoots start emerging. A 10-10-10 fertilizer is recommended no matter which option you choose to follow. Along with applying a complete fertilizer, incorporating some additional phosphorus at the time of planting can encourage root growth. Types of phosphorus often used are bone meal or superphosphate. However, it is important to get a soil test of the planting area to determine if there is already enough phosphorus in the soil which could save you time and money.

A question that occasionally is asked with spring-flowering bulbs deals with tulips. Often people plant tulips, enjoy them for one season, but are then disappointed when they don't come back in the second season. In Eastern North Carolina, tulips are thought of as annual flowers in that they would have to be replanted every year. Our climate and soil temperature tend to stay too warm for tulips to come up year after year.

As we get into the fall season, take time to purchase some spring-flowering bulbs to plant this November. When it is late winter and you are anxiously awaiting spring weather, you will be glad that you planted those bulbs and added color in the landscape to welcome in spring.

For more detailed information and a list of bulbs grown in NC, visit Chapter 10 of our NC State Extension Gardener Handbook at https://content.ces.ncsu.edu/extension-gardener-handbook/10-herbaceous-ornamentals#spring. Lastly, if you want to learn about different bulbs, find photographs, and determine growing characteristics, visit our Extension Gardener Plant Tool Box at https://plants.ces.ncsu.edu/ find_a_plant/. By using the find a plant feature you can select various plants and bulbs and learn about their specific growing conditions. For bulbs, pay attention to the hardiness zone ratings. Bulbs that overwinter in NC will have a hardiness zone rating of 8 or less (the smaller the number the more cold hardy the plant). Hardiness ratings of greater than 8 should be dug and stored inside during winter as they are two tender to survive in the ground. Some plants with marginal hardiness rating at or just near 8 can be left in the ground but should be mulched heavily. Remember to pull back this mulch in the spring as heavy mulch on bulbs can


disappointing. If, however you Pamlico's Trey Munford heads for the endzone with a 1st quarter

If you think you're seeing more moustaches lingering over mens' upper lips as November unfolds, chances are your eyes are not deceiving you. November has long been synonymous with Thanksgiving and the start of the holiday season, but it's also taken on a whole new persona in recent years, and moustaches are a significant part of that new identity.

Arguably as popular as ever, Movember® is a public health-focused effort designed to raise awareness of and support research into men's health issues such as prostate cancer, testicular cancer and suicide. Men who participate in Movember typically begin growing moustaches on November 1 and keep them throughout the month.

The origins of Movember can be traced to 2003, when two men in Australia, Travis Garone and Luke Slattery, met for a beer in Melbourne. At that point in time, the popularity of moustaches had waned, but Garone and Slattery joked about restoring the stache to its once-lofty status. At the time, a friend's mother was fundraising for breast cancer, and Garone and Slattery were inspired to combine their efforts to bring back the moustache with efforts to raise awareness about men's health and prostate cancer. In a testament to the two friends' skills in the art of persuasion, they were able to find 30 men willing to take up the challenge to grow a moustache. Those who accepted the challenge agreed to follow the rules of Movember, which included paying \$10 to grow a moustache.

That initial campaign generated significant enthusiasm among the initial participants, so the following year a decision was made to formalize their efforts and officially support a worthy cause related to men's health. After some research, prostate cancer was chosen as the issue to formally support. The Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia, though not an official men's health partner of Movember, agreed to accept any funds generated by the 2004 campaign. By that time, 450 men, including some in Spain and the United Kingdom, had agreed to take part, ultimately raising more than AUD \$50,000.

Nearly 20 years later, the moustachioed movement to raise awareness about various men's health issues is still going strong, having funded more than 1,250 men's health projects since its inception. Individuals interested in learning more about Movember can visit us.movember.com.


BOC Seeks Vape Store Ordinance That Won't Go Up in Smoke

A continued topic of discussion at the November 3rd Pamlico County Board of Commissioners (BOC) meeting pertained to what, if anything the County can do to regulate the sales of hemp, kratom, and/or THC products that are often sold along with tobacco products and other goods at what are commonly referred to as "Vape Stores." The debate has been sparked by public complaints about bright lights, hours of operation, and the question of just what are these stores selling, particularly to our youth. The topic reached the point where the BOC asked County Attorney David Baxter to draft an ordinance that places regulations on the operations of these stores. While the Board all seemed in general agreement that something should be done, the discussion centered on how much and how fast to act. Commissioner Doug Brinson was the most vocal, stating that he had run out of patience and was ready to vote now to "get that dope" out of the County. There is however the sticky little issue called the law. Board Chairman Ed Riggs, while completely agreeing that the Board should do their utmost to control the businesses that sell these products, stressed that they must be cautious not to open the County up to legal action by the business owners of these stores. "If we adopt this ordinance, it needs to be iron clad in regards to legal ramifications for the County." There is also the issue of a public hearing which is required for all ordinances before they can be voted on


has been set for the BOC meeting on December 1st. At that time, residents can express their views on the subject. Commissioner Kari Forrest also expressed her desire for the ordinance and that it should contain provisions on the lights and advertising these businesses display. There is also a question about jurisdiction on any ordinance enacted by the County. Along NC Hwy 55, the corridor from Reelsboro to Stonewall has become known as Vape Road, with roughly six similar style businesses located along the route. If an ordinance is enacted by the County, each municipality must then agree to also adopt the ordinance, or come up with their own. As it stands now, only one of the stores the ordinance will potentially affect lies outside of an incorporated town and that one would be the only one the County could regulate without approval from the municipalities. Much of what the County can do as far as regulations involves location and density of these stores. The question arises as to how far the County can legally go to regulate a business that began operations within the law and now is in violation, as far as their proximity to schools, daycares, and churches. Following the public hearing on the 17th, the BOC could vote to approve the ordinance as written, vote to approve with amendments, or table the issue until the County Attorney can review proposed changes.
